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CHRIST'S IMPASSIONED REASON FOR PENTECOST By Glenn Griffith

Text: (Acts 1:8) "Ye shall receive Power--, Ye shall be Witnesses unto me, -- Unto the uttermost part of the earth."

Several important reasons for Pentecost are given in the Word, and they are all needed in their respective arrangements in God's Redemptive scheme. There is the dispensational reason in the fulfilling the shadow with the real in the days of the deliverance of Israel from Egypt's bondage by the Passover, and fifty days later the writing of God's Law on tables of stone on the day of Pentecost. These were fulfilled on Calvary, and fifty days later God wrote by the Holy Ghost His law on the fleshly tables of obedient hearts of His converted disciples in the upper room. Then Pentecost was a fulfilling of Christ's promise to the disciples in the 16th chapter of John, when He said; "If I depart I will send Him unto you -- And when he is come he will reprove the world of sin --." He also, on this day universalized the atonement of Christ, so that souls anywhere could, without the assistance of any earthly priest, bow at an altar of prayer, and obedience to His will, and ask in the name of Jesus to be saved, or afterward sanctified and the blessed Holy Ghost

would apply the Blood by faith to the heart of the obedient seeker, and he could be born again or sanctified holy instantaneously.

But now comes the important reason. More important than any of the preceding reasons which were more or less general, and man had nothing to say about the fulfilling of them, but this one is personal, individual, and it involves both Divinity and humanity directly. Not only revealing the power of God, but the need of the human heart. It was the thing that brought Jesus Christ into the world to -- "destroy the works of the devil" --. It urged Him to go outside the gate, -- "That he might sanctify the people with His own Blood." So important it was to both He, and His disciples, that it became His impassioned "Last Words" (Acts 1:9) before He left this earth to go to the right hand of the Father. Many important things happened during His stay on earth, but this seemed to sum up His whole life, and entirely consumed Him. The personal need of the human heart. He knew He could not build His Kingdom on earth, nor could His disciples carry out the great commission "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel," without being baptized with the Holy Ghost.

They were regenerated, and had pledged their loyalty, and devotion to Christ, but they did not realize the dark principle in their hearts that would, and still causes men to fail God right in the crucial hour and test. No one could make me believe that Peter was not sincere when he said, "I will follow thee to prison and to death if need be -- I will not forsake thee -- ." But Jesus knew the denying principle was there, and said, "Before the cock crows, thou wilt deny me thrice." So with this battle with subtle carnality Peter came to the testing place of his experience. We are not tested when we are in the midst of a great revival or camp meeting, when we are enjoying the fellowship of the saints, and everyone agreeing with the preaching of the evangelists and the tide of the spirit high, and the atmosphere charged with the presence of the Holy Ghost. But the test comes when we are out there where the atmosphere is not conducive to shout, but the pressure is on, and persecution comes, and the reproach of the cross comes to us. It is then and there where the carnal heart causes a Peter or any disciple to cower back in defeat, and shrink from his responsibility with holiness (Christ) on trial. It is then that He needs witnesses unto Him. It is in the high schools, and colleges where the pressure is on, and only a definite experience of heart holiness will hold souls steady. It is when the pressure against preaching both negative holiness and the positive and the lines are drawn against worldliness, and sin that the preacher is tested as to whether he will deny or preach without fear or favor with a broken heart, the whole gospel regardless of the reaction to him. It was here that Peter failed as he warmed his hands at the wrong fire, and compromised with strangers, and never awakened to his denial till the cock crew, then he discovered his need and went out and wept his way back to Christ, and led the way to the upper room to "tarry" till that sin principle or 'denier' was taken out. Then there was the covetousness of James and John seeking the place of prestige, and wanting to pray fire down upon another crowd that was having a revival, because they were not of their group. Then too there was poor old doubting Thomas who was just as sincere as any, but he could not get clear through, and Jesus invited him to thrust his hand in His side and put his fingers in the nail prints in His hands before he said, "my Lord and my God" -- A denying, a place seeking, a doubting witness could not do Jesus any good to plant the cross in every man's heart. He must have disciples who would dare to do and die if need be, and who would not sell out for any price at any time regardless of the cost. Of course, there was Judas, but he never got to Pentecost, for he betrayed. He would never meet conditions, and was so shallow and selfish to have his way, that when Jesus stopped him on the

threshold of the last supper, and said; "That, that thou doest do now -- bringing him to a decision," he went out and it was night -- forever, for he died a spiritual suicide.

Jesus is pleading for souls to tarry today, that He may have witnesses, true holy witnesses in this tragic hour, who will not deny Him, doubt Him, nor betray Him. The blessed Holy Ghost still sanctifies, and purifies the heart from inbred sin, and empowers for witnessing to the end of the world, and will keep throughout eternity if souls walk in the light.

THE REASONABLENESS OF HOLINESS

"For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind" (II Timothy 1:7) "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." (Rom. 12:1)

No true doctrine, theory or experience has anything to lose from honest investigation. The doctrine and experience of holiness of heart is so firmly grounded in the scriptures and so necessary for victorious Christian living that the tests of time and the probings of logic have served only to confirm its claims and validate its reasonableness.

Holiness is reasonable because it meets the demand of the intellect. It is only when the carnal mind has been destroyed that one is delivered from the duplicity that makes clear, honest and sound thinking impossible. James declares that, "A double minded man is unstable in all his ways." (James 1:8) The unsanctified man is capable of being for and against the same thing at the same time. Consequently his thinking under pressure is not dependable. He finds it difficult under certain situations to keep a cool head. The experience of heart holiness delivers one from fear and gives him a sound mind. (That is a mind that is not undermined by carnal and selfish motives.) Practically all of the mental problems that plague so many people today could be solved if they would receive the peace of mind that comes from the tranquillity of a holy heart. Holiness is reasonable because it goes deeper than the intellect and satisfies the deep needs of the human heart. The heart is the seat of man's affections. It is the heart that affects all the other avenues of one's life. "Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life." (Prov. 4:23).

"As he thinketh in his heart, so is he." (Prov. 23:7) The experience of holiness completes the double cure for the double nature of sin. Sin in man's heart is of a two fold nature. Inherent sin

and committed sin. Inherent sin or the carnal nature is that which causes men to commit sin. Forgiveness and regeneration brings pardon from the guilt of ones transgressions. Sanctification brings cleansing from the inherited or Adamic sin.

The scriptures are replete with evidence that man needs cleansing from the nature of the sin that goes deeper than sin as an act of the will. "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked. Who can know it?" (Jer. 17:9) "The whole head is sick, and the whole heart faint. From the sole of the foot even unto the head there is no soundness in it; but wounds, and bruises, and putrefying sores: they have not been closed, neither bound up, neither mollified with ointment." (Isa. 1:5-6) Behold, I was shapen in iniquity; and in sin did my mother conceive me." (Psalms 51:5) "For this people's heart is waxed gross, and their ears are dull of hearing, and their eyes they have closed." (Matt. 13:15) "For from within, out of the heart of men, proceed evil thoughts, adulteries, fornications, murders, thefts, covetousness, wickedness, deceit, lasciviousness, an evil eye, blasphemy, pride, foolishness." (Mark 7:2122) But the scriptures also abound with proof that there is glorious deliverance from the carnal mind. "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid. How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein?" (Rom. 6:1-2). "Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin." (Rom. 6:6) "But now being made free from sin, and become servants to God, ye have your fruit unto holiness, and the end everlasting life." (Rom. 6:22) "And you, that were some time alienated and enemies in your mind by wicked works, yet now hath he reconciled in the body of his flesh through death to present you holy and unblameable and unreproveable in his sight." (Col. 1:21-22) "For by one offering he hath perfected forever them that are sanctified. Whereof the Holy Ghost also is a witness to us." (Heb. 10: 14-15) "Then will I sprinkle clean water upon you, and ye shall be clean: from all your filthiness, and from all your idols, will I cleanse you. A new heart also will I give you, and a new spirit will I put within you: and I will take away the stony heart out of your flesh, and I will give you an heart of flesh. And I will put my spirit within you, and cause you to walk in my statutes, and ye shall keep my judgments, and do them." (Ezek. 36:25-27) The song writer expressed it: "Let the water and the blood from thy wounded side which flowed, Be of sin the double cure: Save from wrath and make me pure."

Holiness is reasonable because it is practical. It works in the lives of those who have the experience. It is what the immortal souls of men have ever desired and sought. It enables one to get along with himself and with his fellows, and gives him grace to love his enemies. It enables him to keep his poise amid the shocks of life, keep his faith through the disappointments that come and assures him of acceptance with God in the world to come.

Holiness is reasonable also because it gives man power to become a soul winner. The promise is: "Ye shall receive power and ye shall be witnesses."

The work of redemption has been perfectly accomplished so that the sinner may be forgiven and delivered from the guilt, corruption and power of sin: he may be cleansed with an uttermost cleansing and endued with power from on high. He may be adopted into the family of God and become an heir with Jesus Christ of an eternity of blessedness and glory. He may more than regain the paradise from which the parents of the race were expelled. But so few seem to be aware of the privileges that they may have through Christ. They sit in darkness or stumble on,

bewildered by sin, awaiting for someone to bring to them the light. A hungry world needs help. A perishing world needs relief. A lost world needs salvation. It is reasonable to believe that the image of God restored in man would motivate and empower him to go out and seek the lost regardless of the pain or persecution that might be involved. Surely the experience of heart holiness puts within us a passion for the lost. Charles Wesley wrote:

"Urge on your rapid course, Ye blood-besprinkled bands; The heavenly kingdom suffers force; "Tis seized by violent hands: See there the starry crown That glitters through the skies; Satan, the world, and sin, tread down, And take the glorious prize."

"Through much distress and pain,
Through many a conflict here,
Through blood ye must entrance gain,
Yet O, disdain to fear;
'Courage' your captain cries,
Who all your toil foreknew;
'Toil ye shall have, yet all despise;
I have overcome for you.' "

"The world cannot withstand
Its ancient conqueror;
The world must sink beneath the hand
Which arms us for the war:
This is the Victory-Before our faith they fall;
Jesus hath died for you and me;
Believe, and conquer all."

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REBUILDING THE WALLS By Milton Stewart

"The words of Nehemiah the son of Hachaliah. And it came to pass in the month Chisleu, in the twentieth year, as I was in Shushan the palace, That Hanani, one of my brethren, came, he and certain men of Judah; and I asked them concerning the Jews that had escaped, which were left of the captivity, and concerning Jerusalem. And they said unto me, The remnant that are left of the captivity there in the province are in great affliction and reproach: the wall of Jerusalem also is broken down, and the gates thereof are burned with fire. And it came to pass, when I heard these words, that I sat down and wept, and mourned certain days, and fasted, and prayed before the God of heaven." (Nehemiah 1:1-3)

When Nehemiah in all the luxury of the king's palace received this report of the Jews and of Jerusalem it drove him to his knees with a broken heart. When he learned that the walls had been broken down and the gates burned, the protection of his people, and that they had been scattered and in poverty and in great need it was just about more than the prophet could bear. All these years he bore the king's wine cup. He never one time came before the king sad or with a broken heart. It seems that all this time he had been at ease in the king's palace, where all his needs were supplied and he had lost the burden and concern for his people.

It is so easy in this age of lethargy and ease to get so relaxed in the comforts that are afforded us, that it seems we have just about lost all the burden and passion that it takes to bring about a revival. It is necessary for us to travail in prayer if we ever see a revival in this sinful age in which we live. Jesus said, the Pharisees prayed but it was on the street corners and in the synagogues where they could be seen and heard of men. But travail means more than this, let us get in the closed closets and there stay until all we can see is the broken down walls and a scattered people blinded by sin and the Devil and doomed for a Devil's hell.

Standards have been lowered, the gates not opened but torn down and burned, and the devil and all the forces of hell turned loose on God's people. Truly they have been scattered and many of them have gone down in the battle, given up and compromised with the world, given in to liberalism, programs, and entertainments, etc.

Can anyone please God and spend their time playing religion in some form of programs that the church world is carrying on, while the walls are broken down and the devil and the world has come in and God's people are scattered and they are trying to make a laughing stock out of the old fashioned holiness crowd?

First: They tried to laugh Nehemiah and the people to scorn and despised them and accused them of rebelling against the king. But Nehemiah used Jehovah as his defense. "I know they are laughing and making fun and saying that we can't have a church with these kind of standards, etc., but I believe if we will re-build the walls, travail in prayer, lift up the blood stained banner and keep marching as an army with Christ at the head of the battle and the precious Holy Ghost giving us instructions, God the Father will give us a revival like this nation has never known before.

Second: "When Sanballat heard that we builded the wall, he was wroth, and took great indignation. and mocked the Jews. And he spake before his brethren and the army of Samaria, and said, What do these feeble Jews? will they fortify themselves? will they sacrifice? will they make an end in a day? will they revive the stones out of the heaps of the rubbish which are burned?" The word fortify means to give physical strength. Are we willing to give ourselves, and our physical strength to the work of God? It is going to take hard work and a lot of real sacrifice to build churches and have a place where poor lost men and women can come and find God. I had rather live on cold corn bread and water and wear myself out with a saw in one hand and a hammer in the other through the day, and in some store building or under a tent at night trying to see men and women saved, than to be walking the floor at night trying to figure out some way to pacify some carnal, disgruntled church member in order to keep from getting voted out at the next election and finally lose my soul in a Devil's hell.

Some folk are laying up treasures for this life and forgetting about eternity. But if I can lay claim on a home in the glory world, what do I care about this life. When I come to the judgment if I can hear Him say well done son, enter thou into the joy of the Lord. Those will be the most precious words that could ever be spoken to me. I think the judge will have to recess the courts while I have a shouting spell. Brother that will be heaven to me.

If we can revive a few of the stones out of the heaps of rubbish and get them ready to meet God I will feel like saying thank God. ~ The fire of sin is raging. Just about all the old line churches are burned through with the compromising fires of sin and a lot of good folk have been badly burned but I believe that God will help us get some of them cleaned up and ready for the rapture.

Third: They conspired together and came up to fight against Jerusalem and to hinder them. Nehemiah said, "We made our prayers unto God and set a watch against them day and night. Our enemies are going to fight and the Devil and all the forces of hell are going to turn loose on us, but

we should tell God about it, instead of our friends. I find where God fought for Joshua and the prophets of old, and I believe He will fight for us.

Chapter 4:17 said while they worked on the walls they held a weapon in one hand and worked with the other and their sword was strapped by their side. Our sword is the word of God. If we will use the word as our sword instead of lashing back with our tongues, God will move on the scene and be our defense and with Him we can win every battle.

Fourth: After their laughing and mocking, and fighting and making fun didn't hinder the work then they tried to get rid of their leader. They sent messengers to try to get Nehemiah to come out and to talk it over with them. But Nehemiah sent them word, I am doing a great work, and I haven't got time to come down to you.

I am glad that we have got some good leaders that haven't got time to stop the good work and go down and argue with the critics and the scoffers. We all have got a big job to do and I believe we have got just a short time to do it in.

Then they tried to get in the church to talk to him but he said no! If we keep the Holy Ghost in and the world out we will have to keep the doors shut to the world and keep up our guard. If the world gets in the Holy Ghost will be grieved. We must have the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit. Nehemiah knew that just the walls and a group of people that were willing to work and sacrifice was not enough to defeat the enemy, so they called a fast and repented and called on God.

Our standards, hard work and sacrifice are not enough. Even though we must have this, but we must have God for our strength and His word for our foundation. If not, we will fall apart.

Nehemiah's command to the keepers of the gates was that they were not to open the gates until the sun was hot. If we will keep the doors closed till the Son of God has come and makes hot the hearts of men then the Holy Ghost will bless and stand by in every battle. We can't make it without the Holy Ghost. With God fearing leaders who are not afraid to stand at the head of the battle and a host of blood washed, fire baptized laymen who are willing to give themselves, and their means, and stand by in their prayers, I believe we can rebuild the walls and be on the inside shouting the victory when Jesus comes.

The President is known to admire Gruenther. In conversation with close friends he has also expressed the belief that Gruenther has many 'winning qualities' as a potential political candidate Gruenther is also that political rarity -- a Republican Catholic -- and as one White-House insider phrased it: "That combination is unbeatable." . . . Explaining, he said: "The Democrats have little to gain and much to lose by nominating a Catholic, since the Catholics in this country traditionally vote Democratic anyway. However, if the Republicans ran a Catholic, they would undoubtedly draw off a large bloc of votes which would otherwise go to the opposition." By Ruth Montgomery INS Special Correspondent.

The next presidential election is not until 1960 and the Roman Catholic church is already busy in presenting her candidates. The publicity officials and mass-psychologists of Rome are trying to create the illusion that anyone who opposes their plan are apt to be called intolerant and a bigot. Should they succeed in placing a Roman Catholic in both tickets at the National Conventions, then the American public will be left without any choice, but to elect a Roman Catholic for President. This is going to be their main scheme.

I cannot understand how the Roman Church dares to present a candidate for President of the USA as a Roman Catholic. It is an insult to the American public. Like it would be an insult to the American public for any other religious group to present a candidate as a member of their religion. We have political parties in our beloved country and therefore we do not need the interference of a church group, be that Roman Catholic, Protestant, Jewish etc., for the nomination of our President. Each voter should nominate the man best suited for the position regardless of his religious affiliation.

It is my personal opinion, if we elect for president a candidate who is sponsored by the Roman Church in America and by her 40,000 priests and 35 million Roman Catholics, then it means to endorse the aspirations of that Church in our country. To vote for a Roman Catholic, should he run for President as a Roman Catholic, is like voting the Pope into the White House, as the following official statement will show, because "the authority of the Pope and the Bishops is not restricted to strictly religious matters." Here is in part the political platform of the Roman Church in USA.

"The authority of the Pope and Bishops is not restricted to strictly religious matters " The Register, November 14, 1954, reporting on the address of Plus XII to the International Marian Congress.

"All Catholics must make themselves felt as active elements in daily political life in the countries where they live. They must penetrate, wherever possible, in the administration of civil affairs. All Catholics should do all in their power to cause the constitution of the states and legislation to be modeled on the principles of the true (Catholic) Church. -- Pope Leo XIII, Encyclical of November 1, 1885."

"The ideal situation exists when there is perfect union and accord between Church and State, with each supreme in its own field In this country (U.S.A.) the (Catholic) Church has flourished to such a degree that we may be inclined to think that separation (of Church and State) is a satisfactory and workable plan. The Church holds that this is still a compromise and that the condition is the lesser of two evils . . . non-Catholic methods of worshipping God must be branded counterfeit." -- Living our Faith, Catholic High School Religion Series, page 247

"But constitutions can be changed, and non-Catholic sects may decline to such point that the political proscription of them may become feasible and expedient. What protection would they have against a Catholic State? The latter could logically tolerate only such religious activities as were confined to the members of the dissenting group. It could not permit them to carry on general propaganda nor accord their organization certain privileges that had formerly been extended to all religious corporations, for example, exemption from taxation. . . It is true, indeed, that some zealots and bigots will continue to attack the Church because they fear that some years hence the United States may become overwhelmingly Catholic and may then restrict the freedom of non-Catholic denominations. Nevertheless, we cannot yield up the principles of eternal and unchangeable truth in order to avoid the enmity of such unreasonable persons." -- Monsignor Ryan & Millar, The State and the Church, pages 38, 39, a current famous book approved by the Roman Hierarchy.

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A MESSAGE FROM GOD By Spencer Johnson

"I have a message from God unto thee." (Judges 3:20)

Messages from men come frequently and are often unimportant. But when God speaks it is worth while to listen. God has a message to you, sinner friend.

I. -- First of all. He wants you to realize that you are lost and need to be saved. God's Word declares that all men are lost through sin. "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God." (Rom. 3:22) "Behold I was shapen in iniquity and in sin did my mother conceive me." (Psalms 51:5) "But the scripture hath concluded all under sin." (Gal. 3:22) "For God hath concluded them all in unbelief, that he might have mercy upon all." (Rom. 11:32) "For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive." (I Cor. 15:22) When you realize that the state of your heart is one of sinfulness and your life stands out before you in increasing blackness and your soul faces the fact of judgment and punishment for your sins and the Holy Ghost arouses your conscience to the awful truth that you are a condemned sinner and that the wages of sin is death and that you deserve nothing but eternal torment, then you are under old fashioned Holy Ghost conviction. It is then that the same Holy Spirit that convicted you will point you to the message of hope in Jesus Christ.

II. -- There is no salvation except through Jesus Christ "Verily, verily, I say unto you, he that entereth not by the door into the sheepfold, but climbeth up some other way, the same is a thief and a robber" (John 10:1) "I am the door: by me if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out and find pasture" (John 10:9) "He that believeth on the Son hath life, and he that believeth not on the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him." (John 3:36) "God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." (Rom. 5:8) "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16) "Marvel not that I said unto thee, ye must be born again." (John 3:7) "But we are all as an unclean thing, and all our righteousness are as filthy rags; and we all do fade as a leaf; and our iniquities, like the wind, have taken us away. (Isa. 64:6) "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." (Acts 4:12)

You are now awakened to your need of salvation and see the remedy in Christ but as yet you have not received the grace that saves.

III. -- God calls you to repentance. Saving faith is conditioned upon repentance. You will have no trouble believing when you have reached believing ground. Repentance involves sorrow for our sins and a confessing and forsaking of them. Repentance is a Godly sorrow that brings a

voluntary forsaking of sins. To repent is to renounce the love and practice of sin. With much sorrow and shame we must acknowledge our sins, forsake every one of them and turn to God.

"Repent, and turn yourselves from all your transgressions; so iniquity shall not be your ruin.: Cast away from you all your transgressions, whereby ye have transgressed; and make you a new heart and a new spirit: For why will ye die, O house of Israel? For I have no pleasure in the death of him that dieth, saith the Lord God: wherefore turn yourselves and live." (Ezek. 18:30-32) "Only acknowledge thine iniquity, that thou hast transgressed against the Lord thy God." (Jer. 3:13) "For I acknowledge my transgressions: and my sin is ever before me." (Psalms 51:3) "Ye were made sorry after a godly manner. Godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation not to be repented of." (II Cor. 7:9-10) "Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon." (Isa. 55:7)

God commands repentance. "Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matt. 4:17) "Repent ye, and believe the gospel" (Mark 1:15) "Except ye repent ye shall all likewise perish" (Luke 13:3) "Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord." (Acts 3:19) "And the times of this ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men everywhere to repent." (Acts 17:30) "He that covereth his sins shall not prosper; but whoso confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy" (Prov. 28:13) "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and .to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (I John 1:9)

"What? must I confess the foul deeds of my past life? I am ashamed; I could never lift up my head again." But God had written in His book before you committed those deeds, that there should be nothing hidden. It was the Devil that told you that "Nobody would know." God knew and in His presence there is nothing concealed. You are entering into His presence -- I beseech you, hide not your sin. Remember "he that covereth his sins shall not prosper."

Shall I make a list of all my sins for the public?" No, no. All of your sins were against God; some were public sins; some were private sins against individuals. Confess all your sins to God; of those which were of a public nature, make public confessions; and where you have sinned against an individual, go to that one and tell him that you are seeking peace with God, and want to confess and make peace with him.

True repentance involves restitution. "Because he hath sinned, and is guilty . . . he shall restore that which he took violently away, or the thing which he hath deceitfully gotten" (Lev. 6:4) "If the wicked restore the pledge, give again that he had robbed, walk in the statutes of life, without committing iniquity; he shall surely live, he shall not die." (Ezek. 33:15) "And Zacchaeus stood, and said unto the Lord; behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor; and if I have taken anything from any man by false accusation, I restore him fourfold. And Jesus said unto him, This day is salvation come to this house." (Luke 19:8-9) You can see that to confess to a man that you have robbed him, without making arrangements to pay back, would avail nothing. The devil will tell you -- that if you take such a drastic step you will land in the poor house or the penitentiary. But God will go before you and help you. It would be better to go to heaven even from the penitentiary or the poor-house than to enjoy unjust gain through life

and then spend eternity in a burning fiery hell. But you say, there are some things that are passed beyond your power to make right. Yes, that is one of the sad and bitter results of sin. Too late to restore. But God asks no impossibilities. He will look into your heart and reveal to you your possibilities. He will ask no more -- but He demands nothing less.

You dear friend, are nearing believing ground. If in your heart you are through with sin forever it will not be hard to believe. It was sin that wrecked your life and made this bitter way of repentance necessary. Make no plans to go back to the old sinful life. No man was ever pardoned of his sins who made any provision to sin again as long as he should live. "Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin because he is born of God." (I John 3:9) Do you now forsake your sins? Are you through with the life of sin and all that it meant? The companionships, the places, the habits, the occupations, the pleasures -- all that was a part of the sinfulness of your life you now unreservedly cast from you.

IV. -- Have faith in God. Faith is taking God at His word, doing His will, and asking no questions. "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for the evidence of things not seen." (Heb. 11:1) "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved." (Acts 16:31) "But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his name." (John 1:12)

The Holy Spirit has witnessed to each step you have taken; you know that you have met the conditions, as He has made them clear to you. Now, God says to believe that He does what He 'promised to do. How reasonable that He saves you now. If you have met the conditions as He revealed them to you then the Spirit bears witness that you are a child of God. (Rom. 8:16) "He that believeth on the son of God hath the witness in himself." (I John 5:10) Oh, sinner friend, meet God's conditions today." Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you." (James 4:8) "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." (Matt. 11:28) "And him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out." (John 6:37) "Behold I stand at the door, and knock: if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him." (Rev. 3:20) "And the spirit and the bride say, come. And let him that heareth say, come. And let him that is athirst come. And whosoever will, let him take of the water of life freely." (Rev. 22:17) "For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Mark 8:36-37)

"Jesus is waiting; O come to Him now--Waiting today; Waiting today; Come with thy sins; at His feet lowly bow; Come and no longer delay."

"Jesus is pleading; O list to His voice; Hear Him today, hear Him today; They who believe on His name shall rejoice; Quickly arise and obey."

great surprise she did not come. I held on long just for her. During the altar service I forgot her, but when the testimonies were over, I heard a voice behind me. There she was, and she asked to speak with me. She led me to a window, where she buried her face in her hands, and sobbed like a baby. The tears fell down my own cheeks as I watched her. 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JESUS CHRIST THE MISSIONARY IMPERATIVE By James McNab

I. His Example:

10. Sir, We Would See Jesus. (John 12:20-21). Here is another great missionary example as the Master made contact with the Gentiles, in whom He was "More magnified." These Greeks had heard about Jesus and something down deep in their hearts cried out to Him. This was due, in part, to the world-passion of Christ which was reaching out to them because of the shortness of His time on earth, which would not permit His going to the Gentiles. Adam Clarke notes: "How pleasing to God is this union, when the ministers of His Gospel agree and unite together to bring souls to Christ."

Just as the Greeks sought to see Christ through Philip, one of the disciples, even so the world's multitudes desire to find the Savior and can reach Him only through those of His followers who are READY to PREACH HIM, the GOSPEL, ALL PARTS of the world. Matthew Henry states that: "The bringing of these Greeks to the knowledge of Christ by the means of Philip signified the URGENCY of the Apostles, and the use made of their ministry in the conversion of the Gentiles to the faith and the discipling of the nations."

ALL CHRISTIANS, then, are to be His HERALDS or REPRESENTATIVES. They are to ANSWER His CALL for LABORERS and get themselves OUT to His APPOINTED PLACE that those who HAVE NEVER HEARD may SEE JESUS and come to KNOW Him because of their being AMONG them. If Jesus were on earth today, would He be silent and do nothing? Asked Anna McGhie, from the depths of her missionary heart. "Would the Man of Calvary leave ALL THESE MILLIONS in their TEARS, DISEASE, and SHAME, and refuse to help them? No, He

waits to do His mighty works through US. It is OUR BUSINESS 'to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound."

This is, therefore, a missionary imperative which should send ALL followers of the Master out to tell the MILLIONS of "Greeks" and ALL OTHER NATIONALITIES that there is "Good News" for them. Not only can they "See Jesus," but they can KNOW Him, "Whom to know is Life Eternal." In verse 23, Jesus answered them, saying, "The hour is come, that the Son of man should be glorified." Adam Clarke saw the missionary emphasis in this Scripture and explains and enlarges it as follows: "The time is just at hand in which the Gospel shall be preached to all nations, the middle wall of partition broken down, and Jews and Gentiles united in one fold. But this could not be till after His death and resurrection, as the succeeding verse teaches, The disciples were the first fruits of the Jews; the Greeks, the first fruits of the Gentiles."

Now that we are nearing the midnight hour of time, and millions still HAVE NOT heard the glorious Gospel story, this MISSIONARY IMPERATIVE should become more REAL to us. Why "should we hear the Gospel twice before everyone has heard it once?" But many of us have heard the blessed story scores of times, yea, hundreds of times, while there are MULTITUDES who have NEVER HEARD IT ONE TIME!

Then surely our responsibility is greater than that of any other people since Jesus Christ died on the cruel cross that ALL MEN might have a chance to be saved. TIME IS VERY SHORT, beloved, and there are MULTITUDES YET IN HEATHEN DARKNESS! So let us ALL REALLY "TARRY UNTIL" we are ENDUED WITH POWER FROM ON HIGH, that we may be able to proclaim this glorious salvation to ALL THE WORLD before Jesus comes again!

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CHILDREN! CHILDREN! AND MORE CHILDREN By Dennis H. Reiff

About the middle of November 1958, groups of our trained young people started holding a week of Children's Bible Classes at the different villages. Last week they finished up in the tenth village. In these two months and ten villages there have been 900 different children who attended the Bible Classes. Here in Jalapa there were over 200, in Monjas a few less than 200 and in other villages less. Some of these sought the Lord to get saved, all showed much interest in the classes.

These classes also awakened interest among the grown folks and in most of the places there was preaching service at night with the use of the public address system. This was an attraction and many people came and heard the gospel. Some sought the Lord and we trust there were some real victories.

Many new children came to these Bibles classes and of course that gave a means of making contact with the parents. We trust that there will be a harvest of souls as a result of this effort. Other years we have conducted these Classes but the response was nothing like this year. Pray for these children.

The nineteenth of January our Christian day school started. This year we offered the first five grades. With those who have come and a few more yet to come we will have 80 children. That is quite an increase over the number we had last year. Of these there will be twenty-eight in the dormitory when a few more come who are to get here in the next day or two. Of course the boys and girls dormitories are separate and this year we have the dining rooms separate as well as the play grounds. This arrangement is working very well so far and the natives say they like it much better as there is better order and less discipline problems.

Some of the class rooms are very crowded and more are wanting to come. In the first grade room there are twenty-eight children crowded into a room fourteen feet by eighteen feet and there are two more to come bringing the total to thirty students. We are trying to rent a large house across the street, but do not know yet if that will be possible. That would help so much.

In the grade school all the teachers are natives with the exception that a missionary teaches English one period a day to the fifth grade. The native teachers are doing very well in commanding order in the class room. This is much appreciated as many schools have very little order.

This year we have arranged a chapel room where the children all march in each morning for a devotional period. We want the grade school to be conducted on Christian lines and the children trained in a way in which they can build on a good foundation of faith in the Bible.

Please pray for the teachers, the children and their parents. Don't forget the missionaries either. We need your prayers. -- Dennis H. Reiff, Jalapa, Guatemala

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WHERE THE SICK AND WOUNDED LIE By Ina Moyer

Twenty-four years ago when I first met this old fashioned holiness they sang a little chorus that goes like this:

On the darkest side of the road Where the sick and wounded lie They're calling for help and mercy Oh how can you pass them by? The Saviour asks your love In a service of want and pain And anything more that thou spendest He'll pay when He comes again.

I had long forgotten the song, until many weeks ago God began to talk to me about the vile and wicked corners of this densely populated city of Georgetown. We have been to the nice corners where no one was afraid to go. We have sung and preached and testified and often prayed right out there under the open skies, with the pavement as our altar, with those whose hearts were deeply touched by the gospel. Yes, I preached the last sermon one man ever heard on a corner just

two blocks from our place of worship. He sat in an upstairs window and listened intently as I preached from this subject, "God calls you to repentance." He was murdered the next week. He cannot say when he stands at the judgment that he never heard.

On New Year's Eve night I stood before our wonderful group of people here in Georgetown and told them the burden of my heart. To go to those places where others did not care to go -- out there where the sick, the wounded, the , vile, the undesirables, the beggars, the man and the woman in the gutter were lying. That multitude of men, women, teen-agers and children, that help to make up the "WHOSOEVER" that Jesus died to save. At first the folk gasped, but the longer I preached the more it gripped my own heart and theirs. We put ourselves in their place with no one to care.

We went to the well known story of the Good Samaritan. The preacher passed by -- he couldn't fill his church with that class of people, The Levite passed by -- he couldn't soil his nice suit and dirty his hands to help one who should have known better than to have gotten into such a mess. Both the preacher and the church member said, "NOT ME. God didn't call me to do that." But thank God the Good Samaritan came along, takes one look, sees the helpless fellow and says, "I WILL. He looks hopeless but I'll do my best to help him. But for the marvelous grace of God, I might have been there myself." He got right down there beside him, bound up his wounds, and put him on his own beast and took him to the inn. OH, OH, OH! That's the real burden of my heart. Somehow I wish I could really tell you but I can't find the words. Anyhow we went. Praise God forever!

Yes, we went to the most vile section of Georgetown. We began to sing and here they came: From everywhere, across the street, down the street, out of houses and right out of the rum shops. I could hardly wait to preach. God settled down on our little group of folk -- oh, how they did sing and testify that night. And then with a burning heart to help them, I preached the best I could from this text: "The love of God, hanging on the middle Cross." The blessed Holy Ghost did the rest. We prayed with four seekers. We went back to the same corner this last Monday night. Again God came. The altar filled -- two young girls paid the price and now are walking in the light. Tuesday night the little building where we worship was filled to capacity -- many of them from this vile and wicked corner where the sick and wounded lie. Oh, how can we pass them by?

One fellow who had more rum than he could handle, called me out of the crowd, under deep conviction. He put his hand over his heart -- shook his head and said, "Woman, I wish I could quit this. Those things you said, it did something to my heart. Please pray, won't you pray? I want to quit, but I can't.

We did pray and he prayed but as yet he has not yielded. He was there again Monday night. Oh, America, America, let's really pray -- not words but real effectual fervent prayer. It could be -- it must be that somewhere God has an Isaiah who with burning heart will say, "Yes, LORD, Here am I, send me. Send ME -- Send me Lord! To "the darkest side of the road, Where the sick and wounded lie."

Ever since God so marvelously saved me, and I met the First Missionary, who came all the way from heaven's glory to this heartbroken world, there has been stamped on my heart a burning love to rescue others. Part of that objective has been fulfilled while acting as Missionary Secretary in the Bible Missionary Church. It has been a privilege to serve the Lord in this way, and I am unworthy of the fellowship I have had with my brethren.

Recently I received a call to go to the Mission field. As I waited on the Lord in prayer, the burden deepened, and I saw anew the great expanse of precious souls in the ripened harvest field. I said I would go.

"Go, 'tis the Lord's command! He wants you in the field, 'Tis best for you as God has planned--To Him gladly yield."

About this time in my daily Bible readings, these verses stood out to me: "And Jesus answered and said, Verily I say unto you, There is no man that hath left house, or brethren, or sisters, or father, or mother, or wife, or children, or lands, for my sake, and the gospel's, But he shall receive an hundredfold now in this time, houses, and brethren, and sisters, and mothers, and children, and lands, with persecutions; and in the world to come eternal life." Mark 10:29-30. A few days later, this verse, "And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me." John 12:32, became so real to my heart. And all the time my favorite text emblazoned in letters of gold shone like a star of hope above the confusion and contradictions of creeds and cultures of our day. "Hear it! Behold the Lamb of God which taketh, (or beareth) away the sin of the world." John 1:29.

"Go, hear that mournful cry, from far across the sea. Shall these without the Gospel die? While you would go free."

So I have resigned as General Missionary Secretary, and the Lord willing expect to reach Asmara, Eritrea, East Africa, on February 27, 1959. We, as a family, covet your prayers, desiring above all to magnify our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

"Way in that land of degradation, bound Afric's roam; Bowed there before their senseless idols -- Gods made of wood and stone Fly to the harvest, Brother, Sister Immortal gain--Fields white already for the Master; Go -- gather golden grain."
