## THE WORLD'S ACCUSATION TO CHRIST AGAINST THE CHURCH By Elbert Dodd Luke 9:12-45

Peter, James and John had been with Jesus on the Mount of transfiguration. They had had a wonderful experience on the Mount. They really had been blessed and they wanted to do something on the Mount. But the dire need was in the valley. It is wonderful to climb the mountain peaks sometimes, spiritually, but really the poor dying world is in the valley.

While they were gone, it seems, the disciples had been in a revival and were getting on very well, until a poor man brought his pitiful, demon-possessed boy to the meeting and begged them to help his child. They took one look at the boy and dismissed the meeting, announcing that they had found one that could not be helped.

Let us notice first where they found the boy. It was in the valley that they found him. The world is in the valley of doubts, vice, sins of the flesh, shattered faith and discouragement. People have sinned until their conscience is dead, their lives blighted, their bodies wrecked, and their minds warped.

They have tried worldly pleasure, worldly sports, and dissipation until they are more insane than rational. They are reeling and stumbling on their road to dark despair--lost, damned, and almost doomed--with no one, it seems, who cares.

This is the crowd that is looking to the Living Church of God for help. Can you not my Christian friend, hear their cries in the night? "Help me; Oh help me; help my family; help my child!"

The world is looking to the Church of the Living God for help. The man brought his son to the disciples but they could not help the lad. The world, likewise, is bringing its blind, crippled, half-damned ones to our doors today! Can we--will we help them?

Why could not the disciples help this poor man's son?

First, of all, it was because they were perverse -- crooked themselves. They had a twisted nature within them. They were not sanctified wholly. We know they were not where they should have been spiritually and were in an unsanctified condition because they had been fussing among themselves and finding fault with each other. It is easy for unsanctified people to let little things look big to them. When Jesus encountered the blind man, you remember, He gave him the first touch and he saw men, but they looked to him like trees walking. It is easy for the unsanctified to become critical and to drift to Phariseeism, and from there to legalism. Legalism is a disease of the soul -- a heart condition.

Furthermore, they were faithless. They could not believe that God could deliver so bad a case. God gave us as His people, faith to believe there are no cases to hard for Him. You may say, "But you do not know how deep in sin my son, or daughter, or loved one, or friend has gone." Really, that is not the question. The question is, "Do we have faith to believe that God is able to save the vilest sinner from the deepest sin?" Thank God, I know He is able to deliver the vilest sinner and to set him free.

Jesus said, "Bring your son to me,!" and they brought him. Oh, if we can only get them to Jesus! Jesus seeing the boy, commanded the devil to come out of him, and of course the devil came out, for he had no other choice. And the lad, delivered from the demons and healed, was presented to his father, that he might go out and bless the world. Oh, praise God, there are no cases too hard for our Lord and Saviour! We can shout with Paul, the Apostle, "I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth!"

When the disciples were alone with Jesus they asked Him, "Master, why could not we cast the demons out of the boy?" He gave them the reason, saying, "These go not out but by prayer and fasting."

O, Church of the Living God! The reason you are not having revivals that reach the poor lost world is that you are not paying the price of fasting, praying, and believing God.

O God, waken us! Help us to see the poor, lost world at our door steps, marching in a long line to the judgment.--lost, doomed, and damned.

If the poor lost ones are brought to you for help, are you prayed up so you can help them? Are you willing to pay the price to see them saved and to see the devil cast out of them? Will you not bow your head at this moment, open your heart and say, "Yes, Lord, I am willing!"

THE SECURITY OF HOLINESS

"For other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ. Now if any man build upon this foundation gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, stubble; Every man's work shall be made manifest: for the day shall declare it, because it shall be revealed by fire; and the fire shall try every man's work of what sort it is." (I Cor. 3:11-13)

"Nevertheless the foundation of God standeth sure, having this seal, The Lord knoweth them that are his." (II Timothy 2:19)

Amid the changes and uncertainties of the world, the deep heart need of man is for something sure and steadfast upon which he can build his life and base his hopes. Such a security is offered him through the indwelling presence of the Holy Ghost. It is not an unconditional, eternal security. The scriptures clearly teach that there is no holiness apart from Christ and the Holy Ghost. It is only as we abide in Him that we maintain victory in our hearts, and thus a proper relationship with Him, God does not take away man's freedom of choice when he is saved and sanctified. Man can still choose for himself and he could choose to forsake God and apostatize. Saul, the first king of Israel, did. And "Judas by transgression fell." (Acts 1: 25) Jesus emphasized this truth when He said, "if a man abide not in me, he is cast forth as a branch, and is withered; and men gather them, and cast them into the fire, and they are burned." (John 15:6) Again the scriptures declare, "He that endureth to the end shall be saved." "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life." (Rev. 2:10)

As long as man walks with God he is secure. When he ceases to walk with God he loses his relationship and his standing. "Can two walk together, except they be agreed?" (Amos 3:3) No man by himself is a match for the Devil but the man who keeps himself in the love of God, (Jude 21) maintains the experience of holiness and has One within who is greater than he that is in the world.

The holy man is steadfast in his convictions. His notions may change but his convictions are established on the verities of God's word. The security of the sanctified is endangered by mistaking the true and proper sphere of divine teaching and illumination. As a Mahan wrote: "We have known individuals who have attained to highest forms of spiritual life afterwards making ship wreck by assuming that they were infallibly taught all forms of revealed truth and then bitterly denouncing as unspiritual, worldly, sensual and devilish, all who questioned any of their nudest absurdities. We have known individuals once deeply spiritual by imperiously placing themselves above all need of human teaching, under the claim that they were taught of God, manifest the most proud, boastful, fanatical and hateful spirit and character of which we can conceive." "Knowing this first, that no prophecy of the scripture is of any private interpretation." (II Pet. 1:20)

In every crisis the sanctified man can be victorious if he will. The warfare within has ceased and he is calm and steady. He is not overconfident but guards his security by his attitudes. There are dangers to one's attitude from what some have called "The Peril of a Shattered Ideal." The disciples found this condition when they became aware that their hopes of an earthly kingdom were blasted. Sooner or later in life every Christian will be faced with the test of having every vestige of earthly hope swept away. He will find a time in his life when he has nothing upon which to lean but God. It is then that he will have opportunity to test he reality of the blessing of heart purity. In such an hour one may be tempted to bitterness and to doubt whether anyone has the

blessing, especially is this true when: he discovers inconsistencies in someone in whom he has placed great confidence. When such a storm is on, one who does not really have the blessing, will likely lose his bearings and give way to hatred toward one that once he loved.

In the blighting hour of life's disappointment the true condition of the heart is revealed. It is the attitude of carnality that gives way to bickering, fighting and persecution. Charles Caleb Cotton expressed this weakness in man's nature when he wrote: "Men Will wrangle for religion; write for it; fight for it; die for it; anything but live for it." There is grave danger as Brother W. M. Tidwell puts it, of "the once persecuted, becoming persecutors." (Missionary Revivalist. June 1957)

What then shall be our attitude toward those who profess holiness and yet disagree so diametrically? How shall we reconcile the faults and failures that we see with the experience of holiness? First of all one must be charitable if he is to maintain the confidence of those who disagree or be at fault. There is no tendency in the heart of a real sanctified person to throw rocks or condemn. A spirit of tenderness always characterizes a holy man or woman. If we appreciate and believe in people who are charitable with us, then we should manifest the same grace and charity toward others. A good check on the magnanimity of our spirit is to see how we feel if suddenly we find ourselves in the majority when we have always been used to being in the minority.

In the second place one must make allowance for the human. A man may be ever so holy in his heart and yet make multitudes of mistakes and even blunders through his head. John Wesley said, "holiness is consistent with a thousand infirmities."

The sanctified man overcomes the disappointments and rises from the blow of shattered ideals because he looks unto Jesus and puts no confidence in the flesh. If his hope is built on anything that will not stand the fire then it will go down but if it is fixed on the sure foundation, Jesus Christ, then his faith will stand.

Isaiah faced a tremendous peril when King Uzziah died. Uzziah had been a good king and the country had prospered under his reign. Isaiah and the people had come to look more to Uzziah than to the Lord. God had to remove Uzziah to get Isaiah to really see e Lord and thus get a revelation of his own carnal heart. Isaiah testifies, "In the year that king Uzziah died I saw s/so the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up, and his train filled the temple." (Isa. 6:1)

The experience of holiness secures one's hope. When all earthly props are gone then the heart leans strongest on the Lord. It was not until Abraham had bound Isaac on the altar that he saw Jesus' day and rejoiced. The writer of the Hebrews calls our attention to God's promise to Abraham as an encouragement to our faith and hope. "Wherein God, willing more abundantly to shew unto the heirs of promise the immutability of his counsel, confirmed it by an oath: That by two immutable things, in which it was impossible for God to lie, we might have a strong consolation, who have fled for refuge to lay hold upon the hope set before us: Which hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and stedfast, and which entereth into that within the veil." (Heb. 6:17-1'9)

God cannot fail. He will not fail us now. His promise to Israel is applicable today. "As I was with Moses, so I will be with thee: I will not fail thee, nor forsake thee." (Joshua 1:5)

This is no time to waver or falter. The same cause that motivated our heart a few years ago to step out under the stars and establish the Bible Missionary Church beckons us on today. Our doctrines and standards are the same as they were then. The manual guarantees the right for one to preach his convictions without being called in question over it. The God who called us and commissioned us to carry the gospel to the lost of earth is still the same. There is no time to waste. The world is our parish. Barren, monotonous, deserts of sin in the hearts and lives of men await only the coming of the cleansing water of life to give way to the experience that will make them rejoice and blossom as the rose. Out in the cold, dark mountains there are thousands who await our coming with the light. Multitudes of hungry hearts in the cities and towns both at home and abroad are starving for the gospel of hope that we preach. We must reach them with the bread of life! We must have a compassion for the lost!

The carnal mind is still the same hateful, malicious, enemy of Christ. We must not give it any quarter. We must not compromise God's holy standard. The blood of Christ still cleanses from all sin. The mighty Baptism of the Holy Ghost still destroys carnality. Praise God! A changeless, perfect, omnipotent God is still doing the same spiritual work of Grace in the hearts of men and women today as He did in years gone by.

A holy heart guarantees our hope of Heaven. "Let us run with patience the race that is set before us, Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God." (Heb. 12:1-2) Our pilgrimage will soon be over. The battles will all be fought and won. If we are faithful we shall receive a crown of life and enter Heaven with the saints of light. May God help us to guard our attitudes, look to Jesus, and work until our little sun goes down. Then our hearts shall be secure in holiness until Jesus comes or calls for us.

"The Lord has promised good to me, His Word my hope secures He will my strength and portion be As long as life endures.

When we've been there ten thousand years, Bright shining as the sun We've no less days to sing God's praise Than when we first begun."

## HOW A JEWESS WAS "CALLED UNTO HOLINESS" Mrs. Irene Hanley

Mrs. Hanley is a Hebrew Christian who served as a missionary under a Baptist Board for nearly sixteen years before coming into the experience of sanctification. She is now doing evangelistic and missionary work among both Jews and Gentiles and in the various churches to which she is called.

Lovingly do I dedicate this testimony of God's sanctifying grace to Brother and Sister Robb French, at whose camp meeting in Florida I came into this precious truth; and to Brother and Sister G. I. Norman through whose invitation and prayers I went to that camp meeting, and through whose instruction, intercession and persistence at the altar I came into a real "death-route" experience of heart holiness.

Over two years ago, Feb. 12, 1954, while doing field work for a Jewish Mission Board, I was invited to a camp meeting in Florida. To my horror and disgust, I found it to be a holiness camp meeting--not "tongues" but a camp full of old-fashioned Wesleyan Methodists. I was ready to leave within one hour after my arrival, but somehow the simplicity and love of those people impressed me.

I was also deeply (and shamefully) impressed with their severe plainness in dress and their honesty with themselves concerning the carnality of the human heart. My first reaction was one of repulsion towards those "poor, deluded" souls who, I thought, were in such bondage and error of doctrine (Arminianism). Staunch Calvinist that I was, I had always felt I was holding a good standard of separated living, and for at least fifteen years I had contended for the truth that God could keep us living above the practice of sin if we were wholly yielded to Him. What I never could have previously accepted was that God could give us an experience whereby we could be free from the presence of sin in the human heart.

The blessed Holy Spirit, knowing my hungry heart and the deep-seated longing for inward purity, did not allow me to leave that camp meeting. I listened to the deep preaching of the Word: I observed the shouts of joy and the outward demonstration. In my heart I was critical, although I had heard the shouts of newborn souls in my own denomination (Baptist). I saw their great apparent liberty and freedom in the Spirit, but I said to myself, "cheap exhibitionism--that's all."

The more I listened to the exposition of God's Word, the more it penetrated my heart and created a fierce hunger and longing that I had never before known. My distress became greater as God began to show me the old carnal traits in my heart. He showed me that the "old man of sin" was at constant warfare with the "new man" which I had become in regeneration. I saw the black

depths of my unsanctified, uncircumcised heart. I saw my pride! Maybe others did not think I was proud, and neither did I for I called it something else. Yet only God knows how proud I was.

God showed me my lack of perfect love toward Himself, toward my brethren, and toward sinners. He showed me my haughtiness and my impatience, which brought hasty words and quick spurts of temper. He revealed ungodly ambitions, envy, and jealousy. I was getting to the place where I was a good Baptist than a child of God.

I knew that if I did not walk in this new light from God's revealed Word, and allow the Holy Ghost to thoroughly cleanse and deliver me from this carnal heart, I would never be a soul-winner again. I knew my missionary days were over, and that continued refusal would bring eternal damnation to my soul.

After five days of struggling, this child of God literally ran to an old-fashioned mourners' bench. I was almost there when I tripped and fell, and I crawled the rest of the few feet to the altar. "Except a corn of wheat fall"--but that was not all--Jesus said, "Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone: but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit."--John 12:24. This is not speaking of regeneration, for in regeneration we are given new birth. This is speaking of another experience to follow, that is, death to the old self-life. Thus in actual experience, not only in position, do we become identified with Him in crucifixion.

After I said Yes to the Lord concerning ever avenue of my life, and surrendered my whole heart, body, and soul, He sent a mighty cleansing, purging, baptizing fire through my being that completely altered my life and future. For over three hours I lay prostrate before the Lord, unconscious of all human surroundings.

Fanaticism? Ah, nay, for was this not the experience of Moses, David, Isaiah, the disciples, the apostles, and Paul? No, this is as far from fanaticism as Calvinism is from Arminianism. I do not believe that "tongues" is the evidence of the baptism with the Holy Ghost. Nor do I believe in sinless perfection, angelic, or absolute perfection, as holiness people are accused of believing, but I do believe in sanctification--He sanctified me wholly.

I used to think holiness people were proud Pharisees, a people who were always patting themselves on the back and in essence saying, "Look how good I am; look how holy I am; by my own spiritual achievements and attainments God is obligated to take me to Heaven." But I found that the reverse is true. This experience of entire sanctification has brought me to the depths of my utter nothingness. God shows me that only by my constant decreasing can He become pre-eminent in my life. More and more do I realize the preciousness of His shed blood, realize that apart from His mercy, His grace, His atoning, sanctifying blood, I cannot stand for one moment. He has multiplied my fruitfulness, stabilized my joy, and completed my victory. He has brought me into an experience that I had always been taught could not be mine until I died. Well, it's true--it could not have been mine until I "died"--but when I did die two years ago I entered into the experience of Hebrews 4:9, "There remaineth therefore a rest to the people of God." Oh, the preciousness of this! Canaan rest! Oh, the sweetness of ceasing from inward strife and strugglings! Oh, the satisfaction of being inwardly clean and free! The past two years have been the most abundant and rich in all the twenty-one years I have known the Lord.

I praise Him for leading me into this "old-fashioned" way. The modern, glamorous, Hollywood type of popular holiness would never have appealed to me. God had given me convictions when He saved me that helped me then to live higher than the majority of professing holiness people do today. I thank Him for the precious saints like the Frenches, the Normans, the Allegheny Conference saints, and many others, who have held to the "old paths." Without their examples, we younger ones in the movement could never have known what the "old-fashioned" way was like.

Remember me in prayer as I witness, first, to my own -- the Jewish fold -- and then to the Gentiles.

Yes, besides the territory in which we already work, and the many unevangelized villages around us, San Pedro Pinula and its surrounding villages were turned over to us.

Pinula itself is 14 miles east of Jalapa, on an all-weather road, and has a population of over 1,000. Five large villages are within six miles of the town, and the rest are up to 15 miles distant. The present professing Christian population consists of 3 families in Pinula, and one family each in two or three of the other villages. Several thousand people have still never been

reached. This is a whole new field, ripe for the harvest. We have rented a house and have started services in town, hoping to soon start work in at least part of the villages. It may take as much or more work than Monjas (where we made regular trips for services for five years before we saw the first person saved) to see congregations in these places, but will you help us pray for this multitude of souls, whose salvation depends upon us? --Paul Reiff

It was in the night when God revealed Himself to Jacob at Bethel (Gen. 28:12), and from that night on he was God conscious wherever he went. Again at Peniel he wrestled until the breaking of the day. The night was long and the struggle fierce. One by one the stars in their path swung past his battle ground and disappeared in the fields of space, but when dawn came he had received the blessing that changed his nature and his name. (Gen. 32:24).

At midnight David would arise to give thanks. (Psalms 119:62). When Eli became so spiritually deaf he could no longer hear the message of the Lord, God spoke to Samuel in the night. (I Sam. 3:3). In the night God appeared to Solomon and granted his prayer for wisdom. (II Chron. 1:17). Nehemiah hearing of the ravishing ruins of the walls of Jerusalem prayed a prayer of confession and repentance for Israel day and night until God heard him. (Neh. 1:6). In visions at night devoted Daniel received the intricate interpretation of Nebuchadnezzar's dream. (Dan. 2:19). It was said of the prophetess Anna who recognized in Jesus the promised Messiah of Israel, that she served God in the temple night and day with prayers and fastings. (Luke 2:37).

If Jesus the matchless Son of God must continue all night in prayer before choosing His apostles (Luke 6:12), how much more needful it is for all who follow in His steps. John said, "He that saith he abideth in him ought himself also to walk, even as he walked." (I John 2:6).

In the still hours of the night Paul saw the vision and felt the call to Macedonia. (Acts 16:9). The visitation of the Spirit that night turned the gospel westward, saving Europe and America from heathenism. One hardly dares think what the outcome might have been if Paul, the preacher of the pulsating, persuasive, powerful gospel of Christ, had been too sluggish,

slumber-filled, and sleepy-eyed to see the vision. The Wesleys and Whitefield would have been unheard of: the great holiness revival would not have swept two continents; there would have been no Sunday schools, no prison reform movement, no anti-slave acts; Germany, Britain, and France would have never become great industrial nations. Edwards and Finney would have been pagans. America would not be a Christian nation sending out missionaries to the ends of the earth, but would be filled with screaming savages worshipping the sun, moon and the earth. The men would be brutes and the women slaves.

At midnight the prisoners in the Philippian jail heard Paul and Silas as they prayed and sang praises, and the events that followed proved God heard them too, for He sent an earthquake to their rescue, loosing their bonds and moving the jailer to saving faith in Jesus Christ. (Acts 16:25). On one occasion after the Jews had sought to tear Paul limb from limb God stood by him that night and revealed his witnessing mission at Rome. (Acts 23:11). In the midst of the huge, harassing hurricane when neither sun nor stars in many days appeared, Paul, having contact with the angel of the Lord in the night, admonishes the crew of the ship to be of good cheer and assures them that they will not lose their lives. (Acts 27:22-25). The great apostle was so concerned about the sanctification of the church at Thessalonica that he prayed night and day that he might perfect that which was lacking in their faith. (I Thess. 3:10) Often he spent the night interceding for his fellow laborers in the gospel. (I Tim. 1:3).

Ever existent is the need for men who like Abraham will stand yet before the Lord or like Moses throw their souls into the breach. Thank God for the pastor, who, through lonely vigils in the night pressed his way with the needs of the people to the throne of Grace. May God give us a thousand who will do the same and it will change the course of our nation and the world. "And shall not God avenge his own elect, which cry day and night unto him, though he bear long with them? I tell you that He will avenge them speedily. Nevertheless when the Son of man cometh, shall he find faith on the earth?" (Luke 18:7,8).
